
Thornhill A Home for all Hardies


In 1817 a young John Hardie crossed the Atlantic Ocean to seek his fortune in America. He arrived in New York Harbor, and eventually settled in Talladega County, Alabama. In 1835 John and his wife, Mary built a home for their family and named it Thornhill after his home in Scotland. There, the peaceful hill under the verdant trees became his final resting place. Over a hundred years passed before his descendant. Anna Meade Minnigerode, bought and restored Thornhill and established gathering place for the descendants of John Hardie. Thornhill is now owned by the Greene family which treasures its rolling hills, green vistas, and stately architecture while graciously welcoming all Hardie descendants. It is a place where we can continue to gather and call Thornhill our "home".





Thornhill Cemetery History



John Hardie John Hardie, a native of Scotland, moved with his wife, Mary Mead Hall Hardie, and their family to Talladega County, Alabama and established Thornhill Farm. John Hardie, who died on August 17, 1848, was the first to be buried in the family cemetery.

As the site for John Hardie's burial the family chose an area on a slight rise located approximately two hundred yards southwest of his home.

Daughter Annie Hardie Lewis inherited Thornhill, all but "one acre of ground, lying in front of present dwelling house and comprehending within its limits the family burying grounds" was set aside. As Thornhill was sold throughout the years, the cemetery was always reserved as a separate entity. Anna Meade Minnigerode transferred to the Thornhill Foundation the one acre parcel on which the cemetery was located and an easement to the cemetery from Alabama Highway 21. In 1985 Marilyn and Pat Greene transferred an acre to the Thornhill Foundation bringing the total

Today, an iron fence encloses the original cemetery which is considerably smaller than two acres. The trees surrounding the Cemetery create the impression of the ruins of a cathedral with only the branches and sky for its roof. There is a profound sense of peace and dignity in the enclosure

The first person to be buried at Thornhill Cemetery in modern times was Anna Minnigerode in 1986. Since then there have been a number of burials including Pat and Marilyn Greene's Daughter, Marianna Greene Henry, and her daughter, Natalie.

There is currently space in the Cemetery for additional burials, and the size of the property deeded to the Foundation by Anna Minnigerode and the Greenes makes future expansions of the Cemetery possible. Access to the Cemetery for burials is controlled by the Foundation for The Hardies, The Greenes, and their related family members in accordance with its Rules of Administration.
